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GROWING in GREATNESS

WOMEN FOR OSU CONTINUES INCREASING IMPACT

mong Women for Oklahoma State University's many achievements over the past six years, the group's leadership consistently points to \$74,000 in scholarships presented to 22 students as the most significant. That's especially impressive considering the organization awarded just one \$2,000 scholarship in 2009. At last spring's Symposium, Women for OSU presented \$5,000 scholarships each to five recipients.

"We have made tremendous progress growing our scholarship program," says Becky Steen, who recently began a two-year term as the organization's chair. "We have increased the value and total number of annual awards, which reflects increasing success inspiring and celebrating philanthropy among the entire OSU family."

Another sign of success is that the 22 scholarship recipients are becoming donors themselves, having already combined for more than \$30,500 in gifts and commitments to OSU. All 13 recipients who have graduated are donors, as are five of the nine honorees who are still in college.

"That is quite a statement," says Pat Knaub, a founding council member. "We know that involving students inspires them to begin giving back, even at such a young age."

Knaub is the former dean of the College of Human Sciences, which established Women for OSU's predecessor in 1995. The organization, then known as Women in Philanthropy: Advancing a Spirit of Caring, became a victim of budget cuts in 2005. When Knaub retired from the college in 2007, she was approached by Kirk Jewell, president of the OSU Foundation, about resurrecting the program and expanding the focus to include all of the university's colleges and campuses.

"In my private moments, I wondered if we could pull this off," Knaub says. "It was a rather daunting task because the earlier program had been on hiatus. But a core group of women dedicated to doing something positive universitywide through philanthropy and leadership came together, and it has been successful beyond my wildest imaginings."

One of those dedicated women was Martha Johnston, a founding member of both iterations of this organization who remains on the council today. She is one of 65 ladies who have served on the Women for OSU Council.

"This is one of the most fulfilling things I've done

in my life," Johnston says. "I look at the newer group and am thrilled we have more women involved. Corporations and companies are involved that weren't in our earlier days. It is exciting to see women have a deeper understanding of what it means to be a philanthropist and more comfort acting philanthropic. I see this group moving forward to inspire student philanthropy, provide more scholarships and ultimately contribute to better lives for people."

Women for OSU is determined to continue inspiring leadership, philanthropy and stronger connections to the university. With that in mind, one major priority over the next year is evaluating and potentially revising the organization's programs and focus. The process will begin with a review of the official mission, vision, goals and

core values. Women for OSU's four committees – awards, events, fundraising and marketing - will also re-evaluate their methods for supporting the program's overall goals.

"Every organization goes through lifecycles," Steen says. "It's time to review, update and refocus to ensure we continue making progress and that the guiding documents are challenging and relevant."

Johnston adds, "This group has always been focused on its mission. If the mission isn't working quite right and needs adjusted, we have changed it. That ability to change with the times is what has really made it very successful."

We will continue to increase the scholarships, reach out to more women who share our passion for OSU, and inspire women to realize their leadership potential through philanthropy."

One major change came in 2013 when the organization began complementing the annual Symposium by hosting regional events throughout the year. All told, more than 1,300 people have attended Women for OSU events over the past six years. These attendees have combined for almost \$325 million in lifetime gifts and commitments to the university, including more than \$1.3 million for funds supporting the Women for OSU program and scholarships.

Steen expects all of those numbers to keep growing as the organization reaches even more people over the next two years.

"We're working toward increasing the number of regional events in surrounding states and beyond," Steen says. "They provide a great way to catch up on all the wonderful things happening at OSU, and give us an opportunity to engage and reconnect with alumni and friends of OSU who may not get back to campus very often."

> "I think we have a really strong, great history and I'm confident all of the incredible women who make up this organization will propel us

to even greater accomplishments in the upcoming years," Steen adds. "We will continue to increase the scholarships, reach out to more women who share our passion for OSU, and inspire women to realize their leadership potential through philanthropy."
